Captain's Column

Gentlemen,

Cedar Creek is behind us and it was a beautiful weekend of Oct. weather and so a very enjoyable weekend. The next morning Greg fixed his usual great breakfast, and we had morning parade. The Genera gave his usual inspiring speech and got us excited for the afternoon battle. We had some more drill with the 51st as well as some free time, Church service etc.

The afternoon battle was similar to the first but I saw even less of it. The two flag bearers from the 51st took hits at almost the first Yank volley. Ray and another 51st member jumped to the front and took up the flags, but handed me their muskets. It being difficult to carry two muskets and a sword I took a quick hit also. A shame since I had decided to make it through the whole battle! The battle went well, and Ray tells me that running back and forth with the flag is a good workout, one he may not need again for a while.

At the end of the day, we broke camp, made out way though the traffic jam and our ways home. All in all, it was a nice weekend with great weather and great experiences.
