I would ask that you not show up at eight but please be in camp, if at all possible, by 8:00. As far as meals, be prepared to fend for yourselves on all meals. I do not see any indication of meals being provided, so please be prepared.

If you have any questions please don't hesitate to ask. Keep in mind, this event has been registered for, so if you bow out, you will have to reimburse the company.

Use and care of the Jefferson Bootee

So now you own a pair of pegged sole Jefferson Bootee's and need to know how to take care of them. On the Missouri Boot and Shoe website, under care instructions, they list 5 things to do to care for your shoes after an event.

- 1. If your shoes are wet or damp let them dry out naturally and do not heat them in any way. The heat will cause the soles to become brittle.
- 2. Clean the shoes. Use saddle soap (Fugawee suggests using Lexol) to clean the uppers as directed on the container. If you put wax or grease on your shoes without them being cleaned it will trap all the dirt and barnyard acids on the shoe leather and damage your shoes.
- 3. Replenish the natural oils and grease by working in Hubbard's shoe grease and allow to dry.
- 4. After the grease is dried, use Lincoln Stain Wax or regular shoe and boot wax and apply liberally to protect the leather.
 - 5. Use a horse hair brush and buff the shoes to a shine.

The shoes you own are pegged with small wooden pegs holding the soles to the uppers. The soles need to be wetted two days before an event to swell the wooden pegs so as not to fall out causing a separation of the sole and upper. It is our custom to put the shoes in a dry dark place after an event for a month or so and pull them out the day of the event and march for several miles not giving the pegs time to swell.

When applying the Hubbard's shoe grease in step #3 above, I suggest putting a generous amount of grease in the crease between the sole and upper to seal the space and make them more water resistant.

In the morning of an event after walking through the dew laden grass and getting your shoes wet resist placing your shoes next to the fire. If you heat your shoes at a fire enough to create steam, damage will occur to the leather of your shoes.

The key is to take care of the upper leather of your shoes. Once the upper leather is damaged, you will have to replace your shoes. If instead you take care of the uppers, you can resole and re-heel your shoes at a fraction of the price of new shoes.
